



FOUR STAGES OF THE 12 STEPS






Steps 1-3 Giving it up

Steps One thru Three: Giving it up:

The cliché "Meeting makers make it" can

be helpful—sort of. Group sharing, early on, helped me to solidify that I was really an alcoholic (Step One), and that a spiritual power, "greater than myself," could restore my sanity, consequently, I would never again have to wake up in another drunk tank (Step Two); also, those many meetings made clear that I needed to ask God for help, el pronto (Step Three). Yet I was told that "Survival on the fellowship was untreated alcoholism," I was also told that although meeting makers may make it to lots of meetings, and learn important and hopeful facts, it was not my solution. This process was only a *beginning*—many alkies who stopped at this point got drunk! Certain of the less sensitive refer to this as: "1-2-3 Cha-Cha-cha (not recommended).

Steps Four Thru Six: Fessing it up:

My sponsor pointed out, just after we prayed the Third Step prayer together, that all my new-found spiritual gusto would soon fade away unless we begin Step Four at once (p. 64). After a short Bob S., Richmond, IN period of spontaneous God-inspired writing, followed by my own reflections,

I then had enough honest information to allow my sponsor to take me through the Fourth Step Process. Step Five was done at first opportunity (p. 74), which started only a few minutes later. Now, being armed with those defects and shortcomings that constituted bondage of self I confessed to myself that I had to become willing to have them removed (Step Six).

Steps Seven Thru Nine: Cleaning it up: I then asked God to remove these suddenly revealed destructive facets in Step Seven, then reviewed and added to my mostly written Step Eight list. After a conference with my sponsor, and prayers to God, I began making my Step Nine amends as suggested in the Big Book.

Steps Ten thru Twelve: Living it up:

have learned that the above nine steps were only a teaching-of-the-heart Steps Ten, Eleven and Twelve, event. are a lifelong process. Living these last three steps is a continuous re-doing (living) of the first nine! Life is easier, and much happier now—I have begun the process of living it up!

The Promises of ALCOHOL

If we are casual about this phase of our development, we will be drunk before we are halfway through.

We are going to know a new imprisonment and a new misery.

We will relive the past and won't be able to shut the door on it.

We will comprehend the word CONFLICT and we will know PAIN.

No matter how far down the scale we have gone, we will sink even lower.

That feeling of uselessness an self-pity will deepen.

We will gain interest in selfish things and lose interest in our fellows.

Self-esteem will slip away

Our whole attitude an outlook upon life will SUCK

Fear of people, and of economic insecurity will multiply.

We will intuitively know how to run from situations that never used to bother us.



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75 Years Ago This Month— On April 19, 1943, Florence R. passes away at Gallinger Hospital in Washington, DC at age 47. In an interview Bill W recalls:

"She came from New York to start a group – I remember finding the records at the Foundation now, about 1936 or maybe 1937, we granted her \$50 to go to Washington and start an A.A. group." [Cf. Schamel, Charles E., *The Washington Group: Foundations, 1936 – 1941* (1995 Edition, p. 24)]

Although her sober days result in the *Big Book's* story, "A Feminine Victory" published in April 1939, Bill W writes, on page 19 in *Alcoholics Anonymous Comes of Age*, "With great valor she had tried to help Fitz at Washington, but she became involved in an early wave of failure there and died of alcoholism." [Cf. *New Reporter*, April 2015, (p.8) and Cf. *New Reporter*, April 2007, (p.2)]


Page 202, Pass It On cites Florence's influence on deciding the Big Book's title. It states "The name 'One Hundred Men' fell by the wayside because of the objections of Florence R., at that time the only female member."

The 2006 WAIA Archives Committee recounts the discovery of Florence's unmarked gravesite at the George Washington Cemetery in Prince George's County, Maryland; and the voluntary contributions which now provide a beautiful head stone marking the spot. [Cf. *Markings*, Spring 2007, (p4) and *New Reporter*, April 2007 (p2)]

As it turns out, one day after Florence's passing, Fitz pens a letter from the Hines VA Hospital to his childhood friend Churchill Murray:

"I developed rear-end trouble while in the Army about November, it got worse - was to

have been operated on at station hospital but an epidemic of something prevented. Was to have gone back to hospital but got a discharge to go into an essential war industry after having been refused it.



In the meantime Arabella came on from California and we got married. ...we lit out for Akron, Ohio where a good A.A. friend of mine is a renal doctor.

...My doctor friend was dubious about my working, but I got a job with Goodyear Aircraft and survived 12 hours a day (including to and from work) for 10 days - then went to a private hospital where the doctor, Bob S., cut into me and discovered cancer. - That created a new situation with Arabella really out on a limb. Fortunately, she had worked at the Veterans Administration and knew General Hines, the head of it.

I shall close - wish I could get hold of that gill net with you and Bro.

An April 1943 article in the Fort Worth (Texas) *Star-Telegram* reports that A.A. has reduced war industries worker absenteeism due to alcoholism. The article states that the A.A. program has helped as many as 5,000 workers return to their jobs. [Cf. A.A.org website timeline.]



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50 Years Ago This Month— During the 1968 riots in Washington, the city block of the Metropolis Club's location on Twelfth Street experiences not a single broken window and is hence dubbed the "holy land." [Cf. New Reporter, June 1966, p.4 and Bill V. in The Metropolis "it can be done" Club: June 1,1966-June 1, 1991, p.7.]

The 1930s and 1940s ball player, "Rollicking" R. H. speaks at the Cosmopolitan Group's group anniversary. R. H. gains notoriety in A.A. by announcing to reporters that he owes his year-old sobriety to Alcoholics Anonymous. [Cf. Pass It On, p.236.]. R. H. was introduced to two members of the Fellowship in Cleveland by his General Manager Roger Slapnicka. The following are extracts from his Cosmopolitan Group share:

When I got into the Cleveland terminal that morning, why, Mr. Slapnicka met me at the top of the stairs; and I just thought, "Well boy here comes another good fine."

So he met me and he took me over to the seat, and there were two gentlemen over there by the name of Bill J. and Lloyd T. They stood up and I shook hands with them; and they said, "R. [H.] Do you want to quit drinking?"

I said, "Ask Mr. Slapnicka. I tried it last year; nobody can help me." They said, "We can help you."

I said, "If you can, for God's sake do it." Because I was on my last legs in playing professional baseball.

So they said, "we belong to a club that's called the Alcoholics Anonymous."

I said, "Well, I never heard of that club.

What kind of a club is that?" He said, "Well, it's a club; and if you want to quit drinking, why we'll talk to you about it."

So Mr. Slapnicka arranged a meeting for us that afternoon down at the ballpark; and we met down there. And Slap asked me, "So R. [H], do you want go and try this?"; and I said, "I'll try anything, because you know I tried it last year and I told you it wasn't going to work. And it didn't because that winter out on the farm I really got drunk."

So the ball club was coming home, to open up on a Tuesday; and of course I had to be there because ... I had to catch ... [that pitcher]; I was his catcher. So Slap says, "R. [H], you stay here three days with the ball club, and when they go on the road four days and when they come back, why, you'll be alright."

And I said, "Well, how are we going to arrange it?" He said, "Well, the last time up at bat, when you go to first base, why, trip over first base and fake a sprained ankle."

And I said, "Well, what if I strike out?" He said, "when you go back to the dugout fall in it." Anyway I hit the ball to the shortstop and went down to first base, and I faked a sprained ankle.

So right after the ball game was over, why Mr. Slapnicka came down to the clubhouse and talked to Vitt and said, "Well, R. [H.] is not going to help you on the ball club. You're only be gone four days; why, just leave him here, and we will have him treated here." He didn't say for what, but he said, "We'll have him treated."

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50 Years Ago This Month— continued

So, the next morning these two fellows, Bill J. and Lloyd T.—I was really a drunk because I had to have two sponsors—came and got me at the hotel and took me down to Akron, Ohio, that's forty miles from Cleveland. And I met Dr. Bob S.—who was the originator of the Alcoholics Anonymous—he and Bill W.—Bill W. was the other one.

So I went into the hospital and met Dr. Bob and he says, "R. [H.], what the hell are you doing here?" And I said, "Well, I don't know, but these two fellows here say that you can help me with my alcohol problem." And he said, "I believe I can, because I'm one of them."

So they put me in bed and he asked if I wanted to drink, and I said "No." I said, "I came here to stop." And I said, "I don't want any." He said, "Well, if you can stand it, why, the more power to you." I said, "I'll stand it." So anyway he came in and sat there and talked to me and told me some of the things that he did when he was drinking. Bill W. (sic), he was a traveling salesman. He'd lock himself in a room for a week at a time—supposed to be out making calls—well he wasn't. Lloyd T. was a sailor and every time his ship would leave port, he'd have enough on him on the ship to last him until he hit the next port.

When I was in the hospital, I think, the four days I was there-- were I'd say about forty of the members of the A.A. came and talked to me. Some of them would come and talk to me at 3:00 o'clock in the morning—because they knew that I would be there. Others would come in the morning—7:00 o'clock in the morning—any hour they were going by

the hospital. They would stop and tell me their story; they have licked the problem of alcohol.

There was one gentleman I'll never forget; he was a professor of Kent College. They had him in the nut-house there in Ohio; and when he told me his story—like Bernice hiding hers in the coal bin, why, he hid his in the flowers. He hid it every place just so he could get at it after he was in the hospital. He had friends that bring it in to him and he finally went nuts.

So after listening to the stories for about four days of these people, and reading the "red book", the *Alcoholics Anonymous* with stories in it, I said to myself, "well, if they could quit drinking, I can quit drinking."

I was the seventy-seventh member of the group—I am the seventy-seventh member! You put it that way. Now that group was started in 1935 by Bob S. and Bill W.; and between '35 and '39 there were seventy-six members in it.

I started the drink back in about 1927, up here at Frederick, Maryland, that's where I started my baseball career in 1925.

On July 31, 1972, in Washington, DC, R.H. departs to the Big Meeting in the Sky. [Bernice is a member of the Cosmopolitan Group in 1968. Cf. *EARLY AA IN AKRON, DISK 6*, (Intergroup Office, 775 N Main Street, Akron, OH 44310)]



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25 Years Ago This Month— The *New Reporter* prints a readership survey asking: for reasons why the newsletter is or is not utilized by themselves or their groups; their preferred emphasis—personal recovery articles, group event information, AA club event information, AA sport team events, area AA history, comments on steps and/or traditions, jokes, other;

for requisite practices to continue and/or to stop; if they would like to join the *New Reporter* Committee.

The survey's results appear to be lost, and the March 8, 1994 WAIA Board of Directors Meeting Minutes reveal, "Mike R. and two others met with the Executive Committee on February 22 to talk about their intention to make the publication more dynamic and a meaningful vehicle for communication. They will be meeting with Lee [WAIA Office Manager] to go over details and would like more people to join the committee."

The General Service Conference:

- (1) asks the General Service Office to review the current practice of providing mailing labels to everyone who requests them and to devise a new policy that will encompass the principle of anonymity. George D. [the GSO General Manager] says that no more mailing labels would be made available to organizations outside the Conference structure;
- (2) approves the publication of a pocket-sized edition of the *Big Book*. This edition will contain all the material in the *Big Book* except the stories, though Dr. Bob's and Bill W.'s stories will be included;
- (3) decides not to extend the delegates' terms to three years.

On April 29, 1993, AAWS distributed a statement advising that it would no longer oppose the use of the circle and triangle symbol on medallions, jewelry or other items.






